takara nipaluna: Aboriginal walking tour

Cost: \$50-60 pp Distance from Conference: 200 m

Following the footsteps of the Aboriginal resistance fighters in 1832, this immersive walk retraces their path as they made their way to the old Government House, where they sought to negotiate an end to the Black War. Led by indigenous guides, this tour stands as the only Aboriginal-led experience of its kind in nipaluna/Hobart, making it an essential and transformative journey for all.

Under Nunami Sculthorpe-Green's guidance, this powerful tour not only sheds light on the past but also highlights the ongoing presence and contributions of the palawa people in shaping our city's identity. Don't miss this chance to gain a deeper understanding and appreciation for the rich Aboriginal heritage woven into the fabric of our community.

And here's the coolest part: as you explore the artworks, you get to use this awesome handheld technology called the O. It's like having your own personal guide, telling you all about the art you're seeing. How cool is that?




Callington Mill Distillery, Oatlands


World Heritage convict sites


Wellington Park

Wellington Park is located just outside of Hobart on the muwinina people's traditional grounds. The park has an incredible number of walking paths and mountain biking routes, which are all clearly marked and should be followed to the letter. Mount Wellington is the most popular attraction in the park, and there are several ways to reach there, including automobile, shuttle bus, and variously arduous treks from Hobart.

The weather at Wellington Park may be quite unpleasant at times, so packing appropriate gear is essential if you want to visit the park; the summits are especially recognised for their cold and foggy tops.

kunanyi/Mt Wellington


A visit up to kunanyi/Mount Wellington is a must see, the beautiful backdrop towering 1271 metres above the city has outstanding views. There are many activities that involve the multiple walking tracks, mountain bike riding and playing in the snow on a winters day. Warm up or cool down at Lost Freight café situated at The Springs, on the road to Mount Wellington. Ideal for grabbing a quick coffee or hot chocolate before you start your adventure.

If you're feeling adventurous, take a drive up to kunanyi/Mount Wellington, if you haven't got a car there are buses that can take you up. An option could be the Mount Wellington Explorer Bus, please click here to book https://mtwellingtonexplorer.com.au/

As mentioned above there are multiple hikes along the mountain but one of my most favourite would have to be the Organ Pipes Track this walk is roughly 3 hours return and would attract some of the most beautiful views of Hobart. This walk is also kid friendly and rated at grade 3 so some bushwalking experience is recommended but not necessary.

After accomplishing the walk grab a hot or cold drink at the Lost Freight café or lunch at the Fern Tree Tavern and warm up by the roaring fire .

Discover Tasmania



1. Cradle Mountain National Park

Cradle Mountain, located in the heart of the Tasmanian Wilderness World Heritage Area, is a destination of great natural beauty. The park's unique and breathtaking landscapes range from moss-covered old rainforests and deep river gorges to snow-covered mountain summits, untamed alpine moorlands, and glacial lakes. Discover deep snowdrifts in winter, spectacular displays of yellows, oranges, and reds across the mountain slopes in autumn as Tasmania's deciduous Fagus turns colour, playful young joeys and hungry echidnas emerging in spring, and the fragrance of wildflowers filling the air as you dip your toe into a crystal-clear lake on a summer's day in this place for all seasons.

Cradle Mountain is linked with nature, wildness, and purity. This stunning national park is teeming with wildlife, including Tasmanian devils, quolls, platypus, echidnas, wombats, and the very curious black currawong.

We recommend visiting Cradle mountain for two or three days, there are huts and camping grounds available, together with numerous hikes and walks for all skill levels.

2. Mount Field National Park

Mount Field National Park, a 90-minute drive from Hobart, offers a fascinating trek across the high ranges. Waterfalls cascade through cool-temperate rainforest at its foot, while magnificent peaks above are littered with glacial lakes and distinctive Tasmanian alpine species including pandani, scoparia, pineapple grass, and cushion plants.

Short and easy walks: The lower slopes of Mount Field are lined with waterfalls, notably the three-tiered Russell Falls, Tasmania's most photographed waterfall. Further, the swamp gum (*Eucalyptus regnans*, often known as mountain ash) reigns supreme in Mount Field's rainforest. It is the tallest tree species in Australia, reaching up to 100m in height, and the world's second tallest blooming plant. Recommended long hike for medium to advanced hikers: Mountain lakes are rarely as well-organized as this line of little tarns running down a bench of alpine terrain on the Rodway Range.

3. Freycinet National Park

4. Maria Island National Park

Off Tasmania's East Coast, around one hour drive from Hobart, Maria Island offers the perfect fusion of natural beauty and historical significance to those who seek it out. Long sandy beaches, blue sea, mountainside panoramas, an abundance of animals, and a multi-layered human history combine together on Maria Island to provide the ideal island getaway.

Maria island is a small island packed with activities. Stroll around the historical walk among Eastern grey kangaroos and wombats. Rent a bike to cover more ground, walk up Mt. Maria or Bishop and Clerk to amaze yourself with 360 views.

5. Bruny Island

Off Tasmania's south-east coast is Bruny Island. One of the best Islands in Tasmania to experience wonderful cuisine and breathtaking wild landscape is Bruny Island, where the local people produce some of the best gourmet items in Tasmania and across the globe. Bruny shines for its cheese, oysters, wines, walks and thriving fauna.

It takes roughly 30 minutes to drive from Hobart to Kettering, where the ferry departs for Bruny. There is no actual need to schedule your departure around the boat because it departs every 20 minutes. More information: <u>https://www.brunyisland.org.au/</u>

6. Three Capes Track

Roughly a 90-minute drive from Hobart, explore Australia's far south-east, one of Tasmania's most scenic tracks that surrounds cliff hugging wilderness. It's all about the journey, you, a pack and 48 kilometres of beauty.

World Heritage-listed Port Arthur Historic Site is your start and end point. A purpose-built Pennicott Wilderness Journeys' boat delivers you to the start of the track. Any migratory whales, dolphins or fur seals are complimentary. Pack light; the overnight stops are equipped with gas cooktops, comfy mattresses and generous dining tables where new friendships may forge.

They say walking can be transformative and this is Tasmania's natural pathway. Four days and three nights on a track so meticulously crafted you're free to enjoy your experience rather than watching every step.

Walk side by side up mosaic stone steps and let nature's drama unfold. Here, your senses will be refreshed, and your heart will skip a beat (regularly). Stand on nature's edge. Hear the silence and be overcome with awe. Move through shadows of tall eucalypt forest and colourful coastal heath. The Tasman Sea is your constant.


